INTRODUCTION AND METHODOLOGY

Purpose of the Study

The City of Kirkland is preparing an update of its Comprehensive Plan for Parks and Community Services. As part of this process, Kirkland Parks and Community Services (hereinafter referred to as "Kirkland Parks") wanted to learn more about current the usage patterns and attitudes of Kirkland residents.

Survey Design & Methodology

The City contracted with Carolyn Browne Associates, a local community involvement and marketing research consulting firm, to conduct the survey. The criteria for classification as a Park User was based on a "yes" response to the question, "Have you or a member of your household been to a Kirkland city park, taken a class, or participated in any activity sponsored by Kirkland Parks and Community Services within the last year?"

Telephone interviews for Kirkland Parks were conducted from October 5 through 13, 2007 with 400 randomly selected male and female heads of households residing within the Kirkland City Limits. Calling was done from 4:00 PM to 8:00 PM, Monday through Friday, and on Saturday from 10:00AM to 6:00 PM. Interviewers were instructed to ask to speak with a head of household and to target about the same proportion of men and women. After qualifying as a possible survey candidate, the person was asked the question about park usage. Of those contacted.

The 10- to 12-minute interview included questions about awareness and usage of park facilities and services, and attitudes toward improving these facilities and services. Demographic data for the respondent and his or her household was also collected.

Interviews were conducted from the supervised telephone bank of GMA Research of Bellevue, WA. Calls were monitored and validated throughout the data collection process. GMA Research also was responsible for coding and tabulation. Carolyn Browne Tamler completed the questionnaire design, coordinated the data collection and coding, analyzed the data, and prepared this report.

Many questions were asked in an open-end format with no suggested responses supplied by the interviewers. Thus, the responses for many of the questions accurately reflect what was on peoples' minds at the time they were surveyed. For many of the tables, a statement in parenthesis - "Multiple, open-end responses; do not add to 100%" - indicates that people were allowed to answer the questions without any prompting or suggestions. Responses were coded based upon the patterns in the answers. The responses that did not fit into coding patterns (in other words, where few others had the same response) are listed for each question in the Appendix of this report.

The random sample of 400 provides data that is projectable to the total population from which it is drawn, with an error range of +/- 5% and a 95% confidence level. For sample sizes of 200 the responses will be accurate, at the same confidence level, with an error range of +/- 7.1 percent. Where data is reported based on sample sizes of less than 200, care should be taken

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in drawing conclusions, as the error range increases sharply as the sample size drops below 200.

Definitions and Report Organization

Tables in this report include data for the 400 total residents interviewed. Comparisons are also provided for households with "Children" and "No children," because of the many significant differences in the responses of these two segments.

For purposes of clarity, the following terms, shown in Italics, are used in this report:

Total Sample – all of the Kirkland heads of households who were contacted and interviewed for this survey.

Those with children/have children - households having at least one child under 18 **Those without children/have no children** - households having no children under 18

The Detailed Survey Results include tables that document the information contained in each section. Detailed Survey Tabulations, which include cross-tabulations of the survey questions, are in a separate bound volume at the City of Kirkland. Individual responses to the open-end questions and a copy of the survey questionnaire are in the Appendix.

Executive Summary

MAJOR THEMES

While just over a third (35%) of the households interviewed for the survey have children under 18 living at home, they represent the a much greater share of Park Users (86% vs. 48% of those without children), people who attend a recreation class or program (44% vs. 19%), people who attend Kirkland sponsored concerts or events (36% vs. 28%).

Households with children, compared to those without children, have a greater interest in most of the suggestions presented for new facilities and new programs, and a much greater proportion say they are willing to pay additional taxes to support what is important to them (77% vs. 59%).

Other significant themes:

- 57% of the residents are users of the Kirkland Parks facilities and services.
- Park Users are generally very satisfied Kirkland Parks, and give high ratings to maintenance, quantity, quality and variety of parks.
- 29% of the Park Users have a household member who has attended a recreation class, arts program or recreation activity sponsored by Kirkland Parks, and three fourths 76%) give high ratings to these programs.
- 44% of the Park Users have a household member who has been on the North Creek Trail in the past year.
- 31% of the Park Users have someone in the household who attended a concert, event or exhibition in the last year sponsored by the City of Kirkland.
- Walking trails, restrooms, preservation of natural areas and children's playgrounds are the most appreciated features of the City of Kirkland parks.
- For those who give high importance ratings to covered sports courts, their primary interests are in courts for basketball and tennis.
- Those who give high importance ratings to athletic fields are most interested in fields for playing baseball and soccer.
- Youth organized sports, teen programs and activities, youth classes and activities, and classes and activities for seniors are rated the highest in importance among park programs and activities.
- The Kirkland Recreation Guide is the primary source of information for people learning about Kirkland Parks activities and programs.
- At present, few residents are looking at the City's web site for information about Kirkland Parks.
- Preservation of major greenways and open spaces is, by far, the most popular choice for new or expanded park facilities.
- The majority (64%) of Kirkland residents is willing to pay additional taxes for the new park and recreation improvements they believe are most important.

REPORT SUMMARY

Park Users

- Fifty-seven percent (57%) of the Kirkland Households are currently "Park Users" defined by those answering "Yes" to whether someone in the household had visited a Kirkland city park, used any park facility or attended any class or event sponsored by Kirkland Parks in the year prior to being surveyed.
- Household with children, compared to those without children, are considerably more likely to be Park Users (86% vs. 48%).
- Nearly half (47%) of the Park Users say that Kirkland Parks is better than other park systems they have experienced; 28% say it is about the same, and only 7% say it is worse (18% have no opinion).
- Half (50%) of the Park Users visited a Kirkland city park at least two or three times a month in the year prior to being surveyed.
- Most of the Park Users volunteered several positive comments about Kirkland Parks, including that they are well maintained, there is a good variety of parks, there are parks close to their homes, and they appreciate the trail system. Few had negative comments, and there were no significant trends in the comments.
- Twenty-nine percent (29%) of the Park Users had someone in the household who attended a recreation class or an activity sponsored by Kirkland Parks.
- Thirty-one percent (31%) had a household member who attended a concert, event or exhibition sponsored by Kirkland Parks.

Park features considered most important

Four of the nine suggested park features rank nearly equal in importance (a 5 or 4 rating):

- 84% Walking trails
- 81% Restrooms
- 80% Natural areas
- 79% Children's playgrounds

However, all but one of these nine features was given a high importance ranking by a majority of the survey respondents:

- 62% Parking
- 57% Athletic fields (primarily for baseball and soccer)
- 55% Picnic shelters
- 53% Trails for bicycles and skaters
- 30% Covered sports courts (primarily for basketball and tennis)

Desired Recreation Programs and Activities

Of seven recreation programs and activities suggested, all but one (adult organized sports) were considered important (i.e., given a 5 or 4 rating) by a majority of those surveyed, and four were selected by seven out of 10 respondents:

- 80% Youth organized sports
- 79% Teen programs and activities
- 75% Youth classes and activities
- 72% Classes and activities for seniors

- 57% Pre-school age activities
- 53% Adult classes and activities
- 33% Adult organized sports

Sources of information about Kirkland Parks and Community Services

The Kirkland Recreation Guide is the primary source (73% of the respondents) of information for people wanting to learn about Kirkland Parks facilities and programs. A considerably smaller proportion mentioned the *Enterprise/newspaper* (18%), *Kirkland Living/Kirkland View* (12%) and friends and neighbors (9%). Only 3% mentioned the City's web page.

When asked specifically about the Kirkland Recreation Guide, most people reported that they had looked through the most recent edition (73%). Asked about the City's web page, only 11% said they had looked at it for information about the City's recreation programs.

Interest in new park facilities

Preservation of greenways and natural open spaces ranks highest on a list of five choices for possible new park facilities. The 5 or 4 rankings for the five suggested new facilities included:

- 84% Preservation of greenways and open spaces
- 69% Development of existing vacant parkland
- 67% Further development of the citywide trail system
- 58% Acquisition of additional parkland for future development
- 46% Development of a recreational facility for activities and events

Willingness to pay for new park facilities

Significantly, 64% of those surveyed said they would be willing to pay some additional taxes per year for improvements they believe are important. Only 21% said they would not be willing to pay any more taxes for park and recreation facilities and improvements, and 16% were unsure.

Households with children - who are much more likely to be Park Users - are more willing to pay for new park facilities and improvements (42% vs. 23% of those without children).

Those who are willing to pay additional taxes to support the facilities and improvements they deem most important are especially interested in:

Demographics of Survey Respondents

<u>Age</u>

The median age of the respondents is 60 years, with 54% aged 55 and over, 14% aged 35 to 44, and 26% in the 45 to 54 age range.

Number in Household

Fifteen percent (15%) live in one-person households; 46% live in two-person households; 14% have three; and 25% have four or more in the household.

Households with Children

Just over one-third (35%) have children under 18 in the household.

Type of Residence/Owner-Renter

Of those surveyed, 77% live in single-family homes, 21% live in condominiums and 2% live in apartments.

Ninety-eight percent (98%) own their home.

Participation in City Elections

Eight out of 10 (82%) of those surveyed say they voted in a city election within the past two years.

Sex of Respondents

Of those interviewed, 38% are male and 62% are female.

DETAILED SURVEY RESULTS AND

SUPPORTING TABLES

EXPERIENCE WITH, AND ATTITUDES TOWARD, KIRKLAND PARKS BY PARK USERS (Tables 1, 2, 3)

Park Users surveyed

The definition of "Park User" throughout this report is based upon the respondents who answered "Yes" to the question: "Have you or a member of your household used any of the services or facilities provided by the City of Kirkland including visits to a city park, participation in a class or activity, or use of the trail system?" Based upon the incidence rate for the first 200 completed interviews, it was determined that 57% of the households in the City of Kirkland qualified as "Park Users."

Once identified as Park Users, respondents were asked a series of questions about the facilities and services used by members of their household.

Households with children, compared to those without children in the household are considerably more likely to be Park Users (86% vs. 48%).

Overall attitudes toward facilities and services

Kirkland residents are generally satisfied with the park and recreation facilities and services provided. Nearly half (47%) say that that Kirkland Parks is better than other park and recreation systems they have experienced; 28% say it is about the same; only 7% say it is worse; while 18% have no opinion.

Those with children are slightly less inclined to have a generally positive attitude toward Kirkland Parks (43% vs. 49% of those without children believe the park system is better; 11% vs. 3% believe it is worse); and 13% vs. 23% had no opinion.

Fifty-nine percent (59%) of the respondents had at least one positive comment. The positive features suggested most often by those interviewed include: well-maintained parks (41%), variety of parks (21%), parks close to home (15%), and the trail system (7%).

Only 18% had a negative comment, but there were few patterns to the responses. Five percent (5%) mentioned that parks were not well maintained and that there were not enough programs for young children. The latter comment accounted for the greatest share of the negative attitudes of those with children.

City park usage/attitudes toward Kirkland city parks

One-third (33%) of the Park Users surveyed said someone in their household had visited a Kirkland park at least once a week in the previous year; 17% went to a park two or three times a month; 17% went once a month; and 22% went less frequently; 11% had used a service of Kirkland Parks but had not visited a city park.

When asked about Kirkland Parks visited by members of the household, the ones named most often included: Heron (50%), Highlands (20%), Kirkland Sports Park (20%), and Pine Meadow (11%). However, several parks were mentioned that are not owned by the City of Kirkland (McCollumn, Cherry, North Creek, Chopper).

Households with children, compared with those without children, were far more likely to have been frequent park visitors (41% vs. 28% at least once a week, and 21% vs. 10% two or three times a month).

Park Users gave high ratings to the level of maintenance at city parks – 46% rate it a 5, and 43% rate it 4 on the 5-point scale, where 5 is "Excellent" and 1 is "Poor." They gave high marks, though not nearly as high, to the quantity, quality and variety of Kirkland city parks (25% rated it a 5 and 47% gave it a 4 rating.

Participation in recreation classes, programs and activities

Of the total Park Users, 29% said that someone in their household had attended a recreation class, an arts program or presentation, or participated in a recreation activity provided or sponsored by Kirkland Parks.

Households with children were considerably more likely to have participated in a recreation class or program (44% vs. 19%).

Most people went to City Hall's Community Room (53%), the Kirkland Sports Park (17%) or a local school (17%) for this activity.

Three-fourths of the Park Users gave high marks to the existing Kirkland recreation programs (26% rated it a 5 and 50% rated it a 4).

Some 44% of the Park Users had a household member who was on the North Creek Trail.

Just under one-third (31%) had a household member who attended a concert, event or exhibition sponsored by the City of Kirkland in the past year.

PREFERRED PARK FEATURES AND IMPROVEMENTS (Tables 4a and 4b)

A list of nine specific park features was read to respondents, with the list rotated at different starting points to eliminate bias. Respondents were asked to rate each of the park features on a 5-point scale where "5" was "Very important" and "1" was "Not at all important."

Ratings of nine park features

Four items on the lists are rated relatively the same in importance by eight in 10 of those who were surveyed:

- 84% Walking trails
- 81% Restrooms
- 80% Natural areas
- 79% Children's playgrounds

All but one of the suggested park features is considered important by a majority of the respondents:

- 62% Parking
- 57% Athletic fields
- 55% Picnic shelters
- 53% Trails for bicycles and skaters
- 30% Covered sports courts

Types of athletic fields considered most important

Those (57% of the total sample) who rated athletic fields a "5" or "4" were also asked to name the types of fields they wanted. Baseball (87%) and soccer (73%) were, by far, the most important choices. Some also suggested softball (20%) and football (17%).

The types of athletic fields were rated about the same in importance among those with and without children, with the exception of soccer, which is of somewhat more importance to those with children (85% vs. 72%).

Types of sports courts considered most important

Only 30% of the respondents gave a high importance rating to covered sports courts. Of those to whom these are important, two major needs were listed: basketball (84%) and tennis (59%).

Tennis was listed as a need more often by those with no children in the household (64% vs. 41% of the households with children).

PREFERRED PARK PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES (TABLES 5A AND 5B)

Seven programs and activities were suggested to the respondents, who were asked to rate the relative importance of these programs on the same 5-point scale. The list was rotated to eliminate bias.

Four of the seven received high importance (5 or 4) ratings from a great majority of the respondents (80% to 72%):

- 80% Youth organized sports
- 79% Teen programs and activities
- 75% Youth classes and activities
- 72% Classes and activities for seniors

Two other suggested programs were rated as important by a majority of the respondents: 57% gave a 5 or 4 rating to pre-school age activities, while 53% gave the same ratings to adult classes and activities. However, less than one-third (32%) believe it is important to provide adult organized sports.

Those with children in the household, compared with those without children, were especially interested in youth organized sports (85% vs. 77%), teen programs and activities (83% vs. 74%), and youth classes and activities (90% vs. 67%).

SOURCES OF INFORMATION FOR KIRKLAND PARKS AND COMMUNITY SERVICES (Table 6)

The Kirkland Recreation Guide is the primary source of information for learning about the programs and activities of Kirkland Parks. Nearly three-fourths (73%) mentioned the guide, while just 18% mentioned The Enterprise or newspaper. Other sources mentioned included: Kirkland Living/Kirkland View (12%), friends/neighbors (9%), visits to City Hall (6%), and 3% mentioned the City's web page.

When asked specifically about how thoroughly they had looked at the most recent edition of the Recreation Guide, 41% said they had skimmed it to see what was being offered, 27% reviewed it in detail, 5% looked for a particular activity, and 6% simply discarded it. An additional 21% did not recall receiving the Guide.

When asked about the City's web site, only 11% said they had looked at the web for information about the City's spring and summer recreation programs. Households with children were somewhat more inclined to check out the web for information (20% vs. 8% for those without children).

INTEREST IN NEW OR EXPANDED PARK FACILITIES (Tables 7a and 7b)

New park facilities wanted

Given a list of five possible choices for new park facilities, Kirkland residents, by a considerable margin, rate preservation of the natural greenways and open spaces as the most desired. Eighty-four percent (84%) of those surveyed rated this option as a "5" or "4" on the 5-point scale where "5" is "Very important" and "1" is "Not at all important," and nearly two-thirds (64%) gave this a "5" rating. Other facilities that received "5" or "4" ratings by a majority of those surveyed included: development of existing parkland (69%); further development of a citywide trail system (67%); and acquisition of additional parkland for future development (58%). Considerably less important to city residents is the development of a facility for recreational activities and events (46%).

Those in households with children were generally more supportive of all of the suggested new facilities, but they were significantly more interested than those without children in the development of existing parkland (78% vs. 68%), acquisition of additional parkland (63% vs. 54%), and development of a recreational facility (49% vs. 42%).

Willingness to pay for new facilities

When asked about their willingness to pay for new park improvements or additions they believe are important, 64% of those interviewed said they would be willing to pay something, and 38% were willing to pay more than \$50 per year in additional taxes to fund what they wanted. Only 21% said they were not willing to pay anything, while 16% said they did not know.

Those with children were considerably more wiling to fund new park and recreational facilities (77% vs. 59% of the households without children).

DEMOGRAPHICS OF RESPONDENTS (Table 8)

Age of Respondent

The median age of the head of household interviewed for the survey is 60 years, and over one-half (54%) is 55 and over. Only 6% are under 35 years of age, 14% are 35 to 44, and 26% are 45 to 54.

Park Users, on average, are considerably younger than the Non-Users. Median age for Park Users is 50 years, and nearly one-half (48%) are between the ages of 35 and 54 (compared with just 29% of the Non-Users in this same age group. While only 20% of the Park Users are 65 and over, this is true for 42% of the Non-Users.

In keeping with these age groups, 85% of those in the 35 to 54 age range have children in the household, compared with just 26% in this age range who have no children.

Number in Household

Some 15% of the respondents are in one-person households; 46% have two people; 14% have three; and 25% have four or more.

Park Users, compared with the Non-Users, are considerably more likely to have households with three or more people (51% vs. 22%).

Children in Household

Numbers in the household usually reflect children in the household. While just over one-third (35%) of the respondents have children, nearly one-half (49%) of the Park Users have children compared with just 13% of the Non-User households.

Of the households with children, 25% have at least one child under 6; while 51% have a child in the 6 to 12 age range; and 57% have at least one teenager.

Type of Residence/Own or Rent

Although considerable effort was made to contact as many respondents as possible living in multi-family housing, this group is still much more difficult to obtain without conducting extensive additional calling. Of the total respondents surveyed, 77% live in a single-family residence, while 21% live in a condominium, and only 2% reside in an apartment.

Nearly all (98%) of those surveyed own their residence.

Park Users are more likely to reside in single-family residences (84% vs. 69% of the Non-Users), and those with children are also more likely to reside in single-family homes (96% vs. 76%).

Participation in City Elections

The great majority of those surveyed (82%) said they voted in a city election within the past two years.

Sex of Respondent

Of those interviewed, 38% were male and 62% were female.

PREFERENCES AND CHARACTERISTICS OF THOSE MOST WILLING TO FUND IMPROVEMENTS (Table 9)

Responses were tabulated for those who indicated they were willing to pay something in additional taxes to fund park improvements they thought were important ("Willing to Fund"), compared with those who indicated they were willing either not willing, or did not know if they were willing, to pay additional taxes to fund park improvement ("Not Willing to Fund").

In general, those Willing to Fund believe that Kirkland Parks is better than other park systems they have experienced (51% vs. 38%).

Rating of park features

While an equally high proportion of the Kirkland citizens believe that walking trails are the most important park feature, those willing, compared with those Not Willing to Fund improvements, are somewhat more inclined to rate many other suggested park features as important (i.e. give a 5 or 4 rating), including:
